José Molina grew up in the twenties surrounded by reams of fabric and women in an old textile shop. His childhood was broken, as much by the war as by a family founded on whispers, superstitions and female maledictions. He spent his life battling: first as a recruit on the nationalist side; and later as an assistant in El Corte Inglés, a store that he would watch transform into an empire, in Celia Gámez's Madrid.







Jordi Llobregat knows his business and leads you into a turn of the century world of obsessed men, ambitious students and long buried family secrets that burst open. There couldn't be a better background for such a story than the baroque city of Barcelona and its many dark and poverty stricken barrios at that time. Dos Olas is set mostly in Lisbon, the city in which the greater part of it was conceived. It is constructed through the alternation of two narrative voices which complement each other throughout the book. The first voice is the fragmented narrative of Adélia, a young woman from Cabo Verde who has had to resort to a clandestine abortion and is trying to find Tiago, the only friend who can help her. Adélia's narration goes beyond the process assimilation of a traumatic experience, and becomes a voyage to identity and recognition of her inner self in only three very intense days. Her thoughts and memories overflow in interrupted sequences, like the halting breath of an intermittent monologue. The second narrative is built along the lines of a picaresque novel, in a style that draws on pastiche, humour, and

eroticism. It narrates, in the first person, the life and adventures of Inês do Carmo, a black woman, from her childhood in Tavira to her mature age in Lisbon. The character has been built taking as a basis the inquisitorial process of a real person: Inês do Carmo was a slave who was persecuted by the Portuguese Inquisition, accused of witchcraft and tried in 1755, months before the great Lisbon earthquake. A dialogue is established between the two stories; there is a succession of both voices, which are united by the thread of History (Adéla is preparing a doctoral dissertation about the African slaves who were accused of witchcraft by the Inquisition). Adéla's quest and Inês do Carmo's picaresque story alternate and keep up the tension until the very end.

His short stories book Los que duermen (Those who are asleep) was selected as one of the best first books in 2012 by El Cultural. He edited the anthology of young Spanish writers Bajo treinta. He currently lives in Madrid.

The Sky Over Lima is a wildly imaginative and vivid recreation of this powerful story, but it is also an entertaining ode to youth -in particular, the foppish youth of

two turn-of-the-century rich kids, full of literary pretensions but sorely lacking in poetic sensibility. Throughout these **Houghton Miffling** often hilarious pages follow José and Carlos, through the eyes of piercingly sharp omniscient narrator, as their literary hoax unravels. From the fake bohemian taverns and garrets of Lima, to the

brothels where José and Carlos will learn what stuff men and poets are made of, the novel ebbs and flows with a sure pace, all the time reminding us of the tide on which the real letters were once carried. On the way, we meet a cast unforgettable characters —Georgina, a ship rat with a taste for envelopes, the city's scribe come agony aunt, and the unceasingly perceptive narrator —and witness the prowess of a masterful voice in its own right - that of the author, Juan Gómez Bárcena.
